Dear Friends,

Periodically, the session asks the question, "Where will our church be in the future?" In five years? Ten years? As many of you know, the presbytery offered six churches a free participation with Cyclical Full Circle, an assessment process to help churches look at their present strengths and areas of needed growth and make strategic decisions for exciting future ministry and mission.

Sixty of you participated in the survey emailed to you. Thank you. The leaders have told me this is one of the highest participations on record. This survey is an imperfect tool to begin the conversation about our church's health. It will lead to

more discussions about who we are as First Presbyterian Church and where we want to go in the future.

The next step will be on November 2 when Niki, a team member from Cyclical will meet with the session to discuss the results. We will meet with Niki from 8:00 A.M. to approximately 4:00 P.M. The session will decide the most effective ways to share the information with the congregation.

There are seven areas of discussion.

- 1. Incarnational Disciple-Making this involves growing in our relationship with Jesus Christ and moving beyond our walls and property to share this love with the community. The goal is always sharing God's love in Jesus Christ and helping people find their spiritual gifts and ministry.
- 2. Administrative Competencies the church needs a committed and visionary staff with administrative paths that help people discern God's direction for the church, take risks, and have courage to try new ministries and mission.
- 3. Joining the Mission of God healthy congregations move from resistance to change, from self-serving patterns to serving their neighbors and community. God is always working in us, creating new ways of serving Jesus Christ.
- 4. Leadership Development strong churches equip and train leaders of all ages to accomplish God's mission. This not only includes elders on session, but everyone from children, teens, and adults.
- 5. Contextual Worship worship is always bigger than our personal desires. Healthy congregations have a variety of music, liturgy, and involves multi-generational people involved in the leadership.
- 6. Caring Mutual Relationships "Healthy churches are thriving, multi-tiered ecosystems of relationship." People connect and grow with their closest friends, small group companions, mid-sized communities of care, and wider church family.
- 7. Ecclesial Health and Sustainability healthy churches understand that they exist primarily for those who are not yet there. They equip one another and plan for the future.

This is an exciting time to look at our future. What does God have in store for us? Where is God leading us? May we remember the promise of Jeremiah 29:11-13. For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope. Then when you call upon me and come and pray to me, I will hear you. When you search for me, you will find me.










FALL, FARE & FRIENDS
