Dear Friends,

Friends are there for each other. Like in the song *That's What Friends Are For*. "Keep smilin', keep shinin' – Knowing you can always count on me for sure – That's what friends are for – For good times and bad times – I'll be on your side forever more – That's what friends are for."

Jesus calls us friends. "No longer do I call you servants, for the servant does not know what his master is doing; but I have called you friends, for all that I have heard from my Father I have made known to you (John 15:15)." Imagine that, best friends with Jesus. Whether on a secret mission with GI Joes, building models, or waterskiing, Jesus is with me as my friend. Wherever you go and whatever you are doing, Jesus is near you as your friend.

In the book, *God Has Spoken*, our friendship with God is described. "God's purpose in revelation is to make friends with us. Loving friendship between two people has no ulterior motive; it is an end in itself. Communication is necessary for any friendship. Friendship without conversation is a contradiction in terms."

How do we spend time with your friend, God? How do we communicate? Reading scripture and praying build our relationship with God. Our thanksgiving and service are also connected to this friendship. Do we recognize God during our busy days? So we whisper prayers to him like texting a friend?

Last year on one of my visits to my parents, we did some cleaning out of closets. Mom found her journal from high school. With her permission, I began reading. It was a blessing to see my parents' relationship from the beginning. Lots of dates to the local diner and dances after basketball games. Mom would journal, "Enjoyed my time with Don tonight" and "Don will meet me after the game." She used an unfamiliar phrase. "Don and I enjoyed slipping together." It sounded suspicious to me. Maybe even inappropriate for their son to read. She explained that slipping meant hanging out together and not necessarily doing anything. "Your dad and I enjoyed just slipping together."

May we enjoy and appreciate Jesus's willingness to slip with us.


