Dear Friends,

In the seasons of uncertainty, may we remember our priority as followers of Jesus Christ. Worship. Thanksgiving. Praise. When our health is failing or we are losing patience for healing, worship the Lord. When loved ones are hurting or taken away, remember God is present in the storms and give him thanks. When politics divides and leaders fail, remember God is bigger than politics and stronger than leaders. We can praise God in the uncertainties of the political climate.

Psalm 104 begins and ends with, "Bless the Lord, O my soul." The writer looks around the world and acknowledges God as the creator and designer of all that is

seen. "You have made the moon to mark the seasons; the sun knows its time for setting. You make darkness, and it is night, when all the animals of the forest come creeping out. The young lions roar for their prey, seeking their food from God. When the sun rises, they withdraw and lie down in their dens. People go out to their work and to their labor until the evening. O Lord, how manifold are your works! In wisdom you have made them all; the earth is full of your creatures (19-24)."

There are 5,000 known species of sponges on the ocean floor and over 300,000 species of beetles. There are an amazing number of flowers, trees, birds, and animals. Genesis reminds us God created everything out of chaos. God created order and beauty out of brokenness. God created light out of darkness. The variety and beauty of the world reflect its Creator.

The Psalmist acknowledges God's power and creativity in moon and sun, the animals, and humanity. One writer describes our response this way, "And because it is all designed by divine wisdom, these verses invite us to not just marvel at it all but to explore and study it too. It is an invitation to both science and art." Ultimately, it is an invitation to worship, thanksgiving, and praise. In verse 24, the writer pauses his writing to praise God, "O Lord, how manifold are your works."

When life feels like it is spinning out of control, God is there. When everything you thought was in your hands is dropped, remember the Lord Jesus never leaves your side and surrounds you with love. When there are no clear answers to your questions, know that there are no dead-ends with God. The one who created the world with all its variety, beauty, and complexities, is the one who comes near to you and calls you beloved daughter and beloved son.

Psalm 62:1-2; 5 is one of my favorite comfort verses. "My soul finds rest in God alone; my salvation comes from him. He alone is my rock, and my salvation; he is my fortress, I will never be shaken.... Find rest, O my soul, in God alone; my hope is found in him." Pam and I saw five castles while traveling in Scotland, all of them dating back hundreds of years. These fortresses provided protection. God, the Creator of all things, is our castle.

No matter what the circumstances, may we find our hope and strength in God alone.


