I will leave you with my favorite quote by Thomas Keating, "The start, middle and end of the spiritual journey is the conviction that God is always present." I want to live my life, build my relationships, and lead the church with this conviction, God is always present.




The First Presbyterian Church Evening Book Club has been reading and discussing a book monthly for more than 15 years. Since Covid, we have been meeting monthly by Zoom.

# FAITH AND GRACE: SPIRITUAL GROWTH OPPORTUNITIES COMING THIS FALL

Exciting things are happening at our church during the Sunday 9 A.M. hour. After an insightful and applicable examination of the fruit of the Spirit during the summer, we're moving into fall with two new offerings. If you've never checked out any of our Sunday morning classes, we hope you'll join us this fall and see what's going on.

No classes will be held August 4 because we hope everyone will stay after church to join the celebration luncheon for Pastor Michael, but we will resume Sunday school for all ages beginning August 11. Two new and exciting adult series are on the horizon.

On August 11 and 18 we'll be discussing *Faith at Home*, a reminder that our devotion to God is not just for Sundays. Elements of our faith are reflected in our homes and routines. This study will challenge us to incorporate spiritual rituals and rhythms into our daily and weekly schedules. It will be relevant to parents and grandparents who want to ensure that young family members see active faith regularly modeled and expressed in their homes. It will also be relevant to anyone who wants to explore how to express their faith on a deeper, more consistent level. All ages are welcome. This was a popular class at Montreat this summer, and Tonya Elkins has brought it back for our benefit. Don't miss this opportunity to strengthen *your* faith at home.


Then, on August 25, we'll begin a 12-week study of Philip Yancey's powerful book, *What's So Amazing about Grace*?

"In one of his last acts before his death, Jesus forgave a thief dangling on a cross, knowing full well the thief had converted out of plain fear. That thief would never study the Bible, never attend synagogue or church, and never make amends to all those he had wronged. He simply said, 'Jesus, remember me,' and Jesus promised, 'today you will be with me in paradise.' It was another shocking reminder that grace does not depend on what we have done for God but rather what God has done for us." (From *What's So Amazing about Grace?* chapter 4)

Have you ever felt unworthy to stand before God, undeserving of His love? If so, you're right. None of us deserves the love that God so freely bestows, which is why *grace* is so essential to our salvation and ongoing relationship with Him. Grace, by definition, is undeserved favor. It can't be earned, yet it must be humbly acknowledged and accepted if we're to have a growing relationship with Christ.

*What's So Amazing about Grace?* will investigate the wonder and power of God's grace using short video segments, group Bible study/discussions, and personal study options for those who wish to go a little deeper. It is a fascinating and potentially life-changing series.

We hope you'll join the enthusiasm and fellowship of our Sunday morning classes this fall, beginning August 11. Meetings are upstairs in the Session Room at 9:00. Please schedule these on your calendar and come whenever you can. As we individually strengthen our faith at home and develop a better understanding of God's grace, we can then increase our witness as a church to friends, family, and community . . . and see amazing results.





Reflections...when people look in our church window, what do they see? They would people singing and resighting liturgy. They may see music rehearsals, Bible studies, and discussion groups. 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
